Dear Friends,

Change is the only constant, and no year in my experience has proven that more than 2025. The enormity, frequency and effects of ongoing shifts have felt like we've been on a vessel in an ocean rife with rogue waves.

Commercial fishermen are used to uncertainty, but with government furloughs and budget cuts it was unclear at times if federal managers would be in place to start seasons, never mind programs. In addition, the fleet faced regulatory rollbacks and pauses, market instability and tariff yo-yoing, cuts to science and safety, a renewed federal focus on domestic seafood and working waterfronts, and big changes in management and governance. Some of these changes have been good, others bad, but all have meant all hands-on deck to support fishermen through the upheaval.

As we approach our 35th anniversary, I am struck by how our mission has remained steadfast, even in these unsettled times. Advocacy, policy, science and education have been mainstays since 1991. Highlights include fighting for habitat protections, giving the Cape's fishermen a voice, protecting community fishing rights and quota, collecting data to open sustainable fisheries, uniting the public and fishermen, and feeding our community - especially those facing food insecurity. We have accomplished much.

This annual report showcases work that continues building on our pillars. We expanded our Fishermen Training program, partnering with Cape Cod Community College for educational offerings like welding courses. We increased advocacy for working waterfronts and partnered with fishermen to strengthen zoning protections. We joined sister organizations across the country to increase federal funding for commercial fishing. We invested in collaborative science and economic development. We also continued longstanding programs and events, from Small Boats, Big Taste to Hookers Ball.

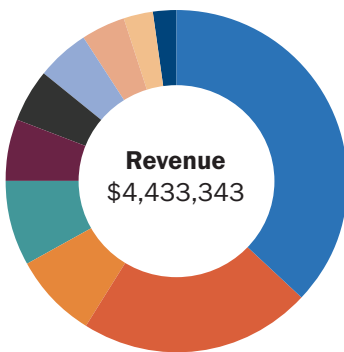
With changes in society, business, technology and the environment buffeting our peninsula, fishermen still go to sea, as they have for generations and as they will for generations to come.

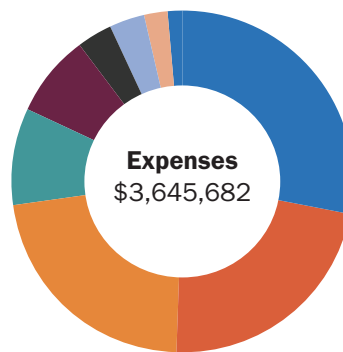

FISHERMEN'S KNOWLEDGE

is invaluable to developing practical and reasonable solutions. Our professional staff brought fishermen's expertise to federal and state decision-making tables, attending hundreds of policy meetings and contributing to fisheries management efforts from North Carolina to Maine. We also often advocate through written testimony and letters of support. Each comment letter ensures fishermen's voices are part of the decision-making before policies are finalized.

THREE FEDERAL POLICY WINS THAT HELP FISHERMEN LOCALLY

- Continued funding for the Young Fishermen's Development Act (YFDA) addresses workforce challenges in the commercial fishing industry by providing training and business development support for new entrants.
- Bipartisan legislation introduced to provide life-saving safety training through the Fishing Industry Safety, Health, and Wellness Improvement (FISH Wellness) Act. Industry-led training and greater access to health programs are essential to fishermen's success and our coastal communities. These programs not only improve the daily lives of small business owners and their families on Cape Cod – they also save lives.
- New seafood liaison position within the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that will help seafood businesses better access and utilize USDA programs.

FLOATING OFFSHORE WIND UK STUDY TOUR

In May, a group of Gulf of Maine fishermen and marine resource managers traveled to Scotland to study floating offshore wind development, including the Kincardine Offshore Wind Farm. Fishermen's Alliance board member, Eric Hesse, joined the tour to learn from the Scottish government, developers, researchers and fishermen how floating wind projects are designed, permitted and integrated alongside active fishing grounds. With proposed floating offshore wind lease sites off Cape Cod, this experience helps ensure fishermen are informed and positioned to advocate for strong engagement and policies that protect both fishing livelihoods and marine ecosystems.



ADVOCACY & EDUCATION IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Fishing representatives Jamie Bassett and Will Nicolai and staff members Doreen Leggett and Ray Rowell traveled to Capitol Hill with Fishing Communities Coalition where they met with congressmen to discuss the importance of working waterfronts, funding for fishery management councils and essential services for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and cooperative research. Policy Director Aubrey Church also traveled with Seafood Harvesters of America to meet with NOAA Fisheries Leadership and discuss opportunities for Executive Order 14276, Restoring American Seafood Competitiveness. These trips to D.C. reinforce how valuable industry input is to elected officials and NOAA leadership, as major seafood policy decisions move from discussion to implementation.

REGIONAL FISHERIES MANAGEMENT IN A CHANGING ECOSYSTEM

This year, under John Pappalardo's leadership, the New England Fishery Management Council incorporated ecosystem considerations into its risk policy, allowing it to address the impacts of climate change, environmental factors, and scientific uncertainties across all fisheries.

COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH

Local scallop vessels hosted Dr. Kirstin Meyer Kaiser from Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution on two research trips to study environmental factors influencing scallop growth. They collected plankton, sediment samples, juvenile scallops, and water quality measurements. This project was funded by Research Set Aside (RSA) quota leasing; our scallop RSA projects provided the local fleet with access to nearly 65,000 pounds of extra scallop quota in 2025.

With partners Commercial Fisheries Research Foundation and New England Marine Monitoring, we expanded the Scallop Image Based Research Fleet. Four vessels are collecting data that is providing new, year-round insights on when scallops reproduce and when their meat has the best quality and yield.

The eMOLT network of technicians installed free bottom temperature and dissolved oxygen sensors on the fishing gear of 121 vessels. With a generous grant from the Innovation Institute at the Massachusetts Technology Collaborative, we assembled the nation's largest cooperative fleet of fishing boats equipped with environmental sensors. These sensors give fishermen information to navigate rapidly changing ocean conditions and provide scientists with near real-time data to improve weather forecasts and climate models.

2025 marked the first full year of the Outer Cape Oceanographic Fleet. Six vessels deployed Conductivity, Temperature, Depth (CTD) sensors to collect weekly measurements of salinity and temperature. This data, along with other sensor data in the region, is available at www.ccocean.whoi.edu.

We also completed a three-year project with Gulf of Maine Research Institute and Maine Coast Fishermen's Association exploring how catch handling impacts the quality of seafood and profitability of fishing businesses. 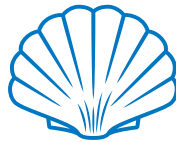

2025 FISHERIES LEADERSHIP INTERN

Our internships are supported by the Nat Mason Memorial Fund and offer students hands-on experience in fisheries policy, community advocacy, and a unique opportunity to work directly with fishermen. Graduate student **Sierra Richardson** (UMass Dartmouth School for Marine Science and Technology) spent 2024 and 2025 working with the monkfish fleet to analyze their fishing data and develop standardized fishery catch rates. She met several times with fishermen to discuss fishing effort trends so she could incorporate factors that influence monkfish catch. Her goal is to improve the accuracy of stock assessments and improve fishery management of New England monkfish. Her work will be peer reviewed in March 2026 for use in management. Sierra has graduated and is currently working for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Division of Marine Fisheries Management.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

We invest in fisheries to provide opportunities for both today's fishermen and future generations.

CAPE COD FISHERIES TRUST

The Cape Cod Fisheries Trust was founded with the vision of ensuring Cape Cod's small-boat fishermen can always access groundfish and scallop quota. When management of these fisheries transitioned to catch share systems, a group of fishermen worked with Fishermen's Alliance to establish the Trust. Today, the Trust serves as a quota bank, allowing local, small-boat, commercial fishermen to lease the quota they need to stay on the water. In collaboration with the Community Development Partnership, the Cape Cod Fisheries Trust also provides financing, business planning, and technical assistance to fishermen seeking to grow and strengthen their businesses.

FIGHTING FOOD INSECURITY WITH SEAFOOD

Through our Small Boats, Big Taste program, we help keep fishermen on the water while increasing access to local seafood. To date, the program has provided nearly 2.4 million servings to food banks and pantries on Cape Cod and across Massachusetts, while generating more than \$6.4 million in economic impact. We have expanded distribution across the Cape, partnering with local organizations to deliver healthy, protein-rich seafood meals to families and individuals who might not otherwise have access to them. The general public can also purchase the Haddock Chowder, Provençal Fish Stew, and Clam Chowder in our online store. In 2025, filmmaker Mark Birnbaum and staff member Seth Rolbein produced a documentary highlighting how the fishing community and several organizations are participating in this program. TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION OF FISHERMEN

The future is now when it comes to training the next generation. In the past several years you may have seen more younger fishermen at the dock as interest in the industry grows, but there is still a pronounced need for crew in many fisheries. To help meet this demand, we have a Fishermen Training program for novices that emphasizes safety and other essential skills. We also expanded our program to offer professional development classes, such as welding, which run in partnership with Cape Cod Community College. We are planning new offerings as we work with fishermen to address the myriad challenges small businesses face.

We are also part of the National Future Fishermen Coalition, which exponentially increases the power of our work by linking it to similar efforts taking place across the country. Ray Rowell, who leads our local efforts, traveled to Florida in the spring to foster collaboration and share resources with our national partners.



WORKING WATERFRONTS

Protecting and strengthening working waterfronts was a primary focus in 2025 as we built on past projects and pursued new initiatives. We started work with the state Division of Marine Fisheries and Urban Harbors Institute at UMass Boston on our second Port Profile report, expected in spring 2026. The first report, published in 2021, provided key insights into the economic value of our ports and helped drive needed investment. The new report, built on surveys from harbormasters and commercial fishermen, will continue to highlight the importance of working waterfronts and generate support for the infrastructure upgrades necessary for resilient coastal communities.

TOWN BYLAW PROTECTIONS TO PROTECT COMMERCIAL FISHING

This year we began working with fishermen and community members on town bylaw protections that will safeguard traditional commercial uses, such as gear storage. This work also aims to defend the culture and character of the Cape, preventing the displacement of the commercial fishing industry.

Meet the Fleet is a beloved educational evening that brings together local chefs and fishermen. In 2025, more than 320 guests learned about oysters, lobster, squid, kelp farming, net recycling with Net Your Problem, and the inner workings of the bustling Chatham Pier Fish Market.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

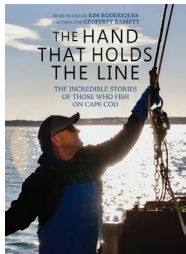

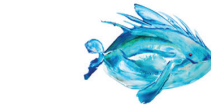
